### Reading: 2 Corinthians 1:3-7

<sup>3</sup> Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, <sup>4</sup> who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God. <sup>5</sup> For just as we share abundantly in the sufferings of Christ, so also our comfort abounds through Christ. <sup>6</sup> If we are distressed, it is for your comfort and salvation; if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which produces in you patient endurance of the same sufferings we suffer. <sup>7</sup> And our hope for you is firm, because we know that just as you share in our sufferings, so also you share in our comfort.

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# Thought for the Day

I can remember quite vividly being confined to bed when I was ill as a child and how time seemed to drag. I was upstairs in my world of illness, but I was aware of another world going on elsewhere. Mum, who had been a Ward Sister, had traditional approaches to illness, which involved isolation and being confined to bed until one's temperature returned to normal. Every now and again, and it didn't seem often enough, she would appear with Aspirin or food, as the world of the well overlapped my world of illness. These moments were the comfort I needed in my distress. Today, we celebrate our Mother's love and ability to reflect, illustrate and demonstrate God's comfort for us too.

The word for comfort in the original version of Paul's letter to the Corinthians most probably means 'deliverance', and so he is thanking God for being the God of all deliverance. Throughout the letter are lists of the difficulties, tests, afflictions and persecutions he has had to endure, so we know that he is not talking about God delivering him to have no experience of trouble; rather deliverance from the worse effects of them. Equally, this comfort has given him encouragement and strengthening grace during his time of affliction. We have a

deliverer, Jesus the Messiah, and one day he will return and rid the world of everything that is fractured about creation and our lives, but in the meantime, we can experience something of his world of deliverance here and now, just as my mum's comforting visits gave me encouragement and a sense that final deliverance from illness would come one day.

And in these difficult and challenging days of the Corona Virus, we must look to Jesus to bring us both aspects of comfort – encouragement in our adversity and deliverance from our adversity. As well as being people who comply with the government's safety measures, let's be people of prayer who seek God's comfort and deliverance found in Jesus Christ.

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have called us to a national day of prayer this Mothering Sunday:

"We have called, along with our fellow church leaders, for a day of prayer and action this coming Sunday - Mothering Sunday has always been both a day of celebration for many and a sensitive and emotional day for some. Wherever you are this Sunday please do join in this day of prayer and action and remember especially those who are sick or anxious, and all involved in our Health Service. As one action, we are calling on everyone to place a lighted candle in their window at 7.00 p.m. as a sign of solidarity and hope in the light of Christ that can never be extinguished."

# Prayer

Lord, thank you for the gift of relationship and community. We pray that, despite having to be separated during this crisis, you Lord, will keep us together at this time. For those of us who are anxious, bring peace. For those of us who are sick, bring healing. For those of us who are caring for others, bring strength. For those of us who are lonely, bring comfort. For those of us who are not lonely, help us to see those who are, and help us to reach out to them in whatever ways we can. In Jesus' name we pray. **Amen**
